Era of Good Feeling

- Demise of Federalists
- James Monroe, 1817-25
- Foreign policy success
 - Good British relations
 - 1818 treaty draws the Canadian border
 - Demilitarized
 - 49th parallel favors US
 - Joint occupation of Oregon Territory
 - Florida: Jackson & the Adams-Onís Treaty, 1819

Monroe Doctrine, 1823

- Revolutions in Spanish colonies
- No new colonies
- No European forms of government
- Existing colonies accepted
- No interference in Europe

Good Feeling and Bad

- Sectional tensions
 - Eli Whitney's cotton gin, 1793

- The Missouri crisis, 1819
 - Tallmadge Amendment
 - Henry Clay's compromise
 - Parity in Senate: Missouri & Maine
 - 36°30′ limit to slavery

- Denmark Vesey conspiracy, Charleston, SC, 1822
 - Southern slavery debate chilled
