Economics of Slavery

- Cotton boom
- Monoculture in the Deep South
- Labor shortage: importation of slaves banned, 1808

Slave Ownership

- Fewer slaveowners
 - Average price: 1850 \$400; 1860 \$800
 - Prime hand \$1200; skilled hand \$2000
 - More slaves per owner
- Popular support for slavery
 - Control competition
 - Race control

- Psychological conditions
 - No rewards
 - Motivation: punishment
 - No hope: slave for life
 - Powerless to affect one's own life
- "Slave mentality" and its legacies

 - The system is stacked against you
- Few slave revolts
 - None after Nat Turner Revolt, 1831
